

JANUARY - ROTARY AWARENESS

Can you believe it? We are half-way through the Rotary year! As we start the second half of the year, we need to stop and reflect on the accomplishments of our clubs and ask ourselves, "How are we doing?" While we are half-way through this Rotary year, there is time for every club to qualify for the Presidential Citation. In addition to the membership increase, the club must complete one activity from each of the six categories listed for the 2007-2008 citation program. The categories include membership, the four avenues of service, and youth.

Now is the time to think about the goals and plans set for our clubs in the 2007-2008 Planning Guide for an Effective Rotary Club. Clubs need to reflect upon the following questions:

1. Are you meeting your membership goal? Remember, we are asking each club by March 31, 2008, to have a net gain of two members.
2. How is your club doing with The Rotary Foundation giving? What percentage of your members participate in the "Every Rotarian Every Year" annual contribution of \$100 per year to The Rotary Foundation? Also, remember that becoming a Paul Harris Fellow or a Major Donor are two ways in which we continue to increase and strengthen our Foundation. We have many Rotarians in our District who contribute \$1000 each year and they are members of the Paul Harris Society. Again, this year members may qualify for the EREY program by selling or buying ten tickets in a drawing for the New England cruise. As you know, Foundation funds are used for simplified matching grants for local community projects, matching grants with a partner from a Rotary Club in another country, scholarship programs, Group Study Exchange and other activities.



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One hundred percent of the monies donated to the Annual Fund comes back to the District at the end of three years. This return, of course, makes The Rotary Foundation one of the greatest in the world.

3. Has your club participated in effective local and international projects? A Rotary Club is only as strong as the members who participate in and support club activities.



I have visited 63 of the 68 Rotary Clubs. Rotarians continue to make my official visits very inspiring. During December, I had the opportunity to visit the Rotary Clubs of East El Paso, Tularosa, Alamogordo, Alamogordo White Sands, Ruidoso, Carlsbad, Fort Stockton, West El Paso, Truth or Consequences, El Paso, El Paso Franklin Mountains, and Northeast El Paso. Also, I attended one of the four the Youth Exchange Program meetings in Socorro, and the Luminaria Walk in Elephant Butte. I had a great time enjoying the club meetings, visiting with boards to learn about the many, many projects in our district, and attending special events. The hospitality in our District is an extraordinary experience.



We will begin another big push for polio eradication. According to Wilf Wilkinson, RI President, "Longtime Rotarians know the history of polio eradication well. There have been triumphs and setbacks. There have been times of rapid advances and times when progress has seemed slow. There have been times when the end seemed very near. But never has it been nearer than it is right now." We will be calling on all Rotarians, especially new Rotarians who have not been a part of the campaign in the past, to do what we can to finish this fight.

1. The District Convention in El Paso, April 24-27th, at the Wyndham Hotel. Soon you will be able to register on line. We promise an informative, as well as fun-filled three days.
2. The International Convention in June in nearby Los Angeles. This promises to be an affordable opportunity to attend an international convention.
3. All Rotarians are invited to attend the chartering of the new Rotary Club in Farmington – The Tres Rios Club – on Saturday, January 19th.

Please continue to make Rotary special in your life and share it with others. My best wishes to each of you for a healthy, joyous new year.

ROTARY WORLD PEACE FELLOWSHIP APPLICATION

Applications for the 2009-11 Rotary World Peace Fellowship are now available. Deadline for districts to submit their endorsed application to The Rotary Foundation is 1 July 2008.

The Rotary Centers provide Rotary World Peace Fellows with the opportunity to pursue a master's degree in conflict resolution, peace studies, international relations, and related areas. Each year, up to 60 Rotary World Peace Fellowships are offered on a competitive basis at six Rotary Centers, which operate in partnership with seven leading universities

Coursework at the Rotary Centers focuses on preventing and resolving conflict by addressing its root causes - for example, responding to hunger with food security, disease with health care, illiteracy with education, poverty with sustainable development, and environmental degradation with conservation.

The fellows are chosen from countries and cultures around the globe based on their potential as leaders in government, business, education, media, and other professional areas. □

To be effective and relevant to a community, a Rotary club needs members. A club's ability to serve the community is directly related to the strength and size of a club's membership base.

Finding Members

It's the responsibility of current Rotary club members to invite other qualified individuals to join Rotary. New members bring important benefits to the club, including an increased capacity to serve the community, future leadership, diversity, and fresh ideas, interests, and energy. Keeping Members

Retaining good members is as critical to Rotary's long-term success and health as the induction of new members. Current members who are dedicated, active, and motivated support the effective functioning of the club and are likely to attract new members. Successful retention strategies include educating members and keeping them involved and informed.

If your club is aware of a member who is moving but still wishes to maintain Rotary membership, encourage that member to complete the relocation form.

When a new member becomes active, involved, and connected, both the club and the new member become stronger.

Ideas for integrating a new member into your Rotary club include:

- Introducing the new member to other club members each week for the first month
- Encouraging the new member to become involved in club service projects
- Inviting the new member to attend meetings of sponsored Interact or Rotaract clubs
- Encouraging the new member to get involved in international programs, such as Group Study Exchange or Rotary Youth Exchange
- Inviting the new member to neighboring clubs for a make-up meeting so they can learn about attendance requirements and observe the spirit of fellowship
- Asking the new member and his or her spouse to social activities, dinners, or other special events
- Encouraging the new member and his or her spouse to attend the district conference
- Appointing a mentor to help the new member become an active Rotarian. □



THE ROTARY FOUNDATION

NEW GRANT STRUCTURE OFFERS FLEXIBILITY AND STRATEGIC FOCUS

Under the new grant structure model for The Rotary Foundation, all grants will fall into one of two categories and consolidate educational and humanitarian programs. The grants will allow Rotary clubs and districts to continue to support their broad service interests and address immediate needs in their communities, while participating in projects with proven results that allocate greater resources to larger and more strategically focused projects.

The first type of grants, modeled after the current District Simplified Grants, are block grants managed by the districts. Designed to give clubs and districts a greater sense of ownership, these grants also provide more flexibility in carrying out local and international projects that will preferably be completed in less than 18 months. A broad scope of activities are eligible, provided they relate and conform to the Foundation's mission. Clubs and districts may form international partnerships to address needs in their local communities or abroad and partner with local organizations on community projects.

Although sustainability isn't required, clubs are encouraged to consider long-term outcomes in their plans. "We envision that some grant projects will serve as a laboratory at the local level for projects that could develop into larger and more sustainable efforts supported by the more focused grant types," said Trustee Ron Burton, a member of the Future Vision Committee.

In the pilot phase, districts will use available District Designated Fund allocations to support the block grants, giving districts more control over their DDF. Some examples of projects that might be funded include books for a local literacy project, travel expenses for a Rotarian providing volunteer service abroad, and tuition costs for a scholarship for a local college student.

The second type of grants are more focused and support larger, more sustainable projects related to one of the three to five strategic areas of focus (to be established by the Foundation Trustees at their April 2008 meeting). An area of focus is defined as a priority world need identified by Rotarians in which the Foundation is directing its resources to have a sustainable and measurable impact that leverages the organization's financial and volunteer resources. Based on demonstrated Rotarian interest and experience, these areas of focus will offer a long-term commitment with potential for sustainable beneficiary outcomes. This grant type does not include the current corporate project, PolioPlus, or any future one; corporate projects will be independent and the highest priority of Rotary International and The Rotary Foundation.

Clubs and districts may apply for this type of grant with an international partner, club, or district to support a focus area project of their choice. Or they may apply for a grant established with a strategic cooperative relationship organization designated by the Foundation. In an effort to also consider Group Study Exchange and Ambassadorial Scholarships in a more strategic way, it is possible that the grants will fund participants whose professional or study fields relate to the areas of focus. Specific strategies for activities and projects are still being developed for review by the Trustees in April.

"These larger grants are designed to use Rotary Foundation resources more strategically and to address Rotarians' interests," said Trustee Sakuji Tanaka, member of the Future Vision Committee. "By building on our strengths and concentrating our organizational efforts, we can make far more impact, attract new interest from potential strategic cooperative relationship organizations, and greatly enhance our Foundation's public image."

In addition to the areas of focus, other details about the grant structure require further clarification from the Trustees. "Many questions still need to be answered on how to apply, approve, disburse, and report on these grant types," said Trustee Chair-elect Jonathan Majiyagbe, who is vice chair of the Future Vision Committee. "The Trustees have asked the Stewardship Committee to outline the stewardship needs of the new model." □

INTERNATIONAL SERVICE PROJECTS

BANGLADESH

Last December, volunteers from the United States, Canada, Norway, and Denmark headed to flood ravaged Bangladesh to help immunize children against polio, a waterborne illness that still paralyzes and sometimes kills children in parts of Africa, Asia, and the Middle East.

Leading the group is Rotary club member and polio-survivor Ann Lee Hussey, of South Berwick, Maine. "Until polio is eradicated worldwide, every child remains at risk," said Hussey.

Bangladesh reported 18 cases last year after being polio-free since 2000. Despite this recent outbreak, great progress has been made in Bangladesh. Before Rotary and its partners began the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) in 1988, an estimated 11,500 children developed polio each year in that country. No polio cases have been reported in Bangladesh this year.

Bangladesh is considered particularly at risk for polio now due to flooding caused by the recent cyclone, combined with its proximity to India, one of four countries where the disease remains endemic. To help knock out the polio virus in the endemic countries and protect nations at risk, Rotary and the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation in November announced a US\$200 million agreement that calls for Rotary to match a \$100-million Gates Foundation grant, with all funds earmarked for polio eradication. □



A LETTER FROM BRAZIL

From the Rotary Club of Albuquerque del Norte

Happy New Year Rotary! Hello Rotary Del Norte! I hope that your new years has kicked off to a great start! It has been far too long since I wrote last, and a lot has happened. Now I'm in my second host family, and it is going really great. Moving was very hard. I really loved my first family, I got along great with them, had a lot of really good times, but I know it's a good experience to change. It's good to meet more people, learn to adapt (haven't I had enough of that already?), and learn more about the different lifestyles there are in your host country....

In addition to immunizing Bangladeshi children for polio, the volunteer team will distribute medical supplies, including bandages, antibiotics, vitamins and worming medication, to help with other health needs related to the flooding.

Additional relief for displaced cyclone victims also comes from ShelterBox, a disaster relief charity funded by Rotary clubs around the world. Each of the 630 pre-packaged ShelterBox kits en route to Bangladesh contains a 10-person tent and supplies sufficient to help a family of 10 survive for at least six months.

As a spearheading partner in the GPEI, Rotary's commitment to end polio represents the largest private-sector support of a global health effort ever. In 1985, Rotary members worldwide vowed to immunize all children against polio. Since then, Rotary has contributed US\$633 million to polio eradication, of which \$17.5 million has supported immunization campaigns in Bangladesh. Besides raising and contributing funds, over one million men and women of Rotary have volunteered their time and personal resources to help immunize more than two billion children in 122 countries during national immunization campaigns.

Rotary and its partners have made tremendous progress against polio. To date, the number of polio cases has been reduced from 350,000 children annually in the mid 1980s, to less than 2,000 cases all last year. In addition to India, only Nigeria, Pakistan and Afghanistan remain polio-endemic, an all-time low. □

In February, 47 Rotarians will be traveling with the GLP throughout Guatemala. Thank you to these dedicated volunteers who will spend ten days helping to distribute first ever textbooks and basic library materials to 20 schools and installing computer centers in six schools. The donated books will form a "book mountain" in the atrium of the Los Angeles Convention Center. Seating will be provided around the display so that convention attendees can read to local schoolchildren.

"It is symbolic that the mountain of books will be built atop the world map in the atrium's floor design," says Ingo Werk, chair of the initiative and past governor of District 5280. "[Among students] in Los Angeles Unified School District alone, 97 different languages are spoken." □


