Two years have passed since I was named District Governor Nominee and since that time, Carolyn and I have had the benefit of training from many knowledgeable Rotarians in the District, Zone and Rotary International. We have made new friends, traveled many places, been involved in training and planning; but now, it is time to bring it all together. It is time to work with a strong District Support Team to assist the clubs in continuing to "Lead the Way" in their communities. Rotary is made up of individual members that belong to clubs around the world. The District, Rotary International and The Rotary Foundation are the tools that are used to support the work of the Rotary clubs.

Rotary International President, Bill Boyd, has established five Resource Groups to help districts and clubs in specific areas. These are Water, Literacy, Health & Hunger, Family of Rotary and Public Relations. I would like to add three areas to President Bill's list.

I also have a goal of expanding our membership by chartering new Rotary clubs in our District; the District Club Extension committee is already working to form two new clubs.

Second, we all must support The Rotary Foundation. Think about the name of the organization that you belong to "The Rotary Club of \_\_\_\_\_," which is a part of Rotary International. The ability to touch the lives of millions around the world is because of this unique foundation that has been built by Rotarians over many years. It gives clubs the ability to be a part of projects in other countries through matching grants. This program offers the ability to double the funding, in a short time, through a Simplified Grant for a local project. "Every Rotarian Every Year" is at the heart of the continued growth of The Rotary Foundation's Annual Fund, while the Major Donor, Bequest and Benefactor programs are the main support for the Permanent Fund. What would Rotary be without its Foundation? It makes possible scholarship programs, GSE, Literacy, Water, Health & Hunger projects, and Polio eradication programs. Over the years, these programs have contributed much to promote World Peace and Understanding.

## CLUB SERVICE

*ATTENDANCE, CLUB BULLETIN, FELLOWSHIP-FAMILY OF ROTARY, PROGRAM, PUBLIC RELATION, TECHNOLOGY*

Greetings my fellow Rotarians;

Allow me to introduce myself. I am Bob Rosenak a member of the Albuquerque del Norte Rotary Club. D.G. Dennis Edwards has asked me to take the position of club service chair for the district.

In order for us to make our clubs better we need to work on all four avenues of service, however we have been given the task of Club Service Directors for our various clubs so let's get to work and see what we need to do and where we need to go.

There are a great many parts of Club Service for you to consider. Today I want to focus on attendance. A member, who does not attend, is not a member, but a person who calls him/her self a Rotarian! We need Rotarians in the chairs, not just bodies. So let's look at attendance. The R.I rules are that a member shall attend sixty percent of the meetings each year and stay for sixty percent of each meeting. Those members who are outside this figure are in jeopardy of losing their membership. We need to keep in touch with the club secretary on the attendance of our club members. Once we have identified the people whose attendance is lacking we need to contact them and discuss why they are not coming to Rotary. Some clubs have a designated person to keep contacting the missing members, others have the secretary do it or the club service chair person does it. No matter which way you choose, we must contact the missing members and encourage them to attend, or loose their membership. I once belonged to a club that sent out post cards each week. One miss and you got a blue edged card saying we missed you this week, after a 2nd miss it was yellow edged with a reminder of the rules of attendance. The 3rd miss earned a red edge and a warning that the individuals' membership would be terminated if there was another miss. The 4th card was a black edge with a message that said, "Dear former Rotarian, etc" You see some clubs get deadly! I do NOT recommend this approach. I include it only as an example of the lengths some clubs go to in an effort to get their members to the meeting.

No matter how you approach it you need to do something to encourage your members to attend the meetings. I personally feel that those who don't attend and keep their membership demean those of us who make every effort to be at the meetings. In the larger cities there are numerous clubs where a member can make up. In the smaller communities with a single club there are other ways to attend. They can go to the board meeting, attend committee meetings, do work on projects, and even attend on line in the cyber club.

Often the subject of leaves of absence arises. According to the R.I. Manual of Procedure this is an option to be decided by the clubs board of directors. Granting leaves and the length of the leave is entirely up to the board.

Another aspect is the early departure of members from meetings. Our club encourages members to stay for the program but sometimes it is necessary to leave early. We ask that those who plan to leave early sit near the door and depart prior to the introduction of the speaker. There is nothing more upsetting than to stand up to make a speech and watch four or five people walk out. This is again a place where you as club service director need to be watchful. If it is the same people walking out week after week then you need to approach them, and find out why they are unable to stay. Once in a while a person needs to leave for an appointment or in the case of lawyers a trial, but to habitually depart early does not make for a good Rotarian. A quick word on late arrivals. We had a proposal to fine members who came in late; my thought is if you do this they will just skip the meeting. So, again, we encourage arriving on time, but being late is sometime unavoidable.

So now you have some of my ideas on attendance, in future newsletters I will get into club bulletins, membership drives, and other parts of your job. The one thing I must say is HAVE FUN! Don't let it get to you, and don't loose sleep over it.

## VOCATIONAL SERVICE

*BUSINESS OF THE YEAR AWARD, ROTARY VOLUNTEERS, VOCATIONAL AWARENESS, VOCATIONAL AWARD*

### Vocational Service

As business leaders, Rotarians share their skills and expertise through vocational service, one of the Four Avenues of Service. Your vocational service efforts can play a vital role in improving the quality of life for those hardworking members of the community who need direction and expertise. By participating in any of a number of vocational service activities — mentoring, career days, vocational awards, business assistance, or even talking about your job at a club meeting — you can turn your experience into an invaluable resource for others.

Rotary's emphasis on vocational service has its roots in the founding of the organization in 1905. And the use of the classification principle — the guideline by which nearly all Rotary membership is determined — assures that each club has among its members a cross-section of a community's business and professional population.

The second part of the Object of Rotary calls for Rotarians to apply high ethical standards in their businesses and professions, recognize the worthiness of all useful occupations, and to consider their own occupations as opportunities to serve society.

In 1943, Rotarians were provided with a tool to help them achieve their vocational service goals when the RI Board of Directors voted to make The 4-Way Test an official component of the vocational service ideal. The test gave Rotarians a way to assess whether their personal and business dealings were being conducted with truth, fairness, goodwill, and decency.

For the first 80-plus years of Rotary's history, the second Avenue of Service — Vocational Service — was an area that focused on personal contributions that Rotarians could make within their own workplaces. Increasingly, however, clubs began to expand the definition of vocational service by organizing events such as career seminars and vocational training workshops.

So, in 1987, the RI Vocational Service Committee was called together — for the first time in 40 years — to redefine the second Avenue of Service. The committee created, and the RI Board adopted, new committee structures and determined that vocational service was now the responsibility of individual Rotarians and clubs within the workplace and the community.

In 1989, the Council on Legislation adopted the Declaration of Rotarians in Businesses and Professions. This declaration spelled out the high ethical standards referred to in the Object of Rotary, and it gave Rotarians another tool for gauging their own professional ethics as well as the ethical standards they hoped to encourage through vocational service projects.

Every October, Rotarians are encouraged to focus their attention on vocational service. Discussions among clubs and districts on vocational service can lead to projects that not only develop the ethical consciousness and vocational skills of Rotarians but also the talents within their communities. Vocational service month is an opportunity to begin yearlong vocational service activities, ranging from Rotary discussions to awards to community projects.

### Rotary Offers Opportunity for Professional Exchange to Germany



The District 5520 GSE committee is now soliciting applications for the Group Study Exchange team leader and team members to travel to northern Germany April 27 to May 26, 2007. There they will meet with their professional counterparts and participate in a wide range of cultural, social and sightseeing activities in this historic and beautiful part of Germany. Team members must be conversant in German; the team leader must be fluent.

The postmark deadline for submitting an application is for team leader is July 19th; team members, August 2<sup>nd</sup>, 2006. However, it is **highly** recommended that applications arrive well before the deadline in case there are procedural errors that could be rectified.

Group Study Exchange is an educational program of The Rotary Foundation wherein Rotary districts in different countries are paired to send and receive professional study groups of four non-Rotarian team members and one Rotarian team leader to travel for four to six weeks, staying in the homes of Rotarians when possible. It is a unique cultural and vocational exchange opportunity for young business and professional men and women, ages 25 to 40, in their initial years of professional life. The program is designed to develop professional and leadership skills among young adults so that they can address the needs of their communities and an increasingly global workplace.

In the 40 years since this program became an official activity of Rotary International, over 50,000 participants worldwide have taken advantage of this opportunity. Rotary International pays direct travel expenses. Host districts provide all meals and nightly accommodations. Because of the Rotary home hospitality and connections with organizations in their home district, the GSE experience far surpasses any kind of tourist or business travel.

District 5520 has had exchanges in recent years with Portugal, India, Mexico, Australia, and France.

RI requires that team leaders be no more than twenty years older than the oldest allowable team member which means that team leaders should be 60 or under.

“We are looking forward to giving those who come here a real good memory,” says Jörgen Otzen, of the Rotary Club of Perstorp, Sweden, and president of the IFMR. According to Otzen, attendees can get a glimpse of the procession outside the convention center Monday, 12 June, and Tuesday, 13 June, mornings as the group gathers for its excursions.

But the fun begins even before the trip to Malmö and Copenhagen. Prior to their Sunday ride, fellows will enjoy a private dinner, a football-golf match, and barbecue in Otzen’s hometown of Perstorp. Local Rotarians will play host to participating IFMR members.

“We have one Canadian who is flying into Portugal where his bike is located, then riding through Spain and Germany,” Otzen says. Another is flying in from Los Angeles.

“We come from halfway around the world to see each other – it’s so fantastic,” Otzen says. “After 21 years in Rotary, I think fellowship is one of the most important things – it’s important to meet and have fun.”

### **Simplified Grant Guidelines**

Simplified grants are a way that a District 5520 Rotary club can conduct a project in their own community or the District and can have the funds provided by the club matched dollar for dollar by the District. This is a wonderful way to conduct a project within the club's community that will benefit its people and help increase the public image of the club and its work in its home area. The paperwork is simple and the decision to approve the grant is made within the District. The matching portion from the District will be sent to the clubs, approved for a match, after the application cut-off date and after The Rotary Foundation has funded the District with its DDF monies, usually after September 1, 2006. It is anticipated that the District will have up to 34,000 available for Simplified Grant matches during the 2006 -2007 Rotary year. The maximum match from the District to a club will be \$2,000 allowing for a combined project funding of \$4,000, unless the club chooses to fund more than \$2000.

1. All Simplified Grant applications must be postmarked July 1, 2006, or later, with the final postmark date being August 31, 2006. Those postmarked after August 31, 2006, will not be accepted unless there are excess matching funds available after the previously submitted applications have been approved for funding.
2. As applications are received, they will be assigned a number in the order received. After August 31st, based on the number of applications and the final amount of money available for District matches, a drawing will be held by the Simplified Grants committee, and the projects will be selected up to the amount of funds available.
3. The Rotary club requesting the Simplified Grant must have a history of contributions being made to The Rotary Foundation in the previous Rotary year either by the club directly or by its members.
4. The project being matched must be conducted within District 5520; the funds may not be used for projects such as would be funded through The Rotary Foundation for projects outside of District 5520. The funds may be used for a combined project within the District with another Rotary club or organization. The District will match the contribution of each Rotary club up to the \$2,000 limit per club in the case of a combined project.
5. The application being submitted must be complete.
6. If the club is in the process of conducting a matching grant project that is either a Simplified Grant or a matching grant through The Rotary Foundation or has completed a grant under one of these programs, all required paperwork, either interim or final, must be completed within the time requirements of the District or The Rotary Foundation.
